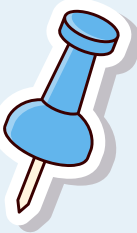
Special water activity Thursday, June 18th

This week in Nursery...

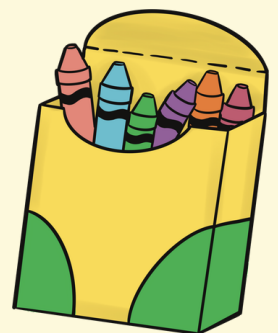


Dear Parents,

This week in our classroom, we continued to learn, create, and have fun together! In Hebrew, we learned the letter Vav (ו) and practiced its “va-va-va” sound. The children were excited to learn new words that begin with Vav, including Vered (rose), Varod (pink), and Vashti. To reinforce our learning, the children created beautiful Varod (pink) collages using a variety of loose-part materials. They were highly engaged in this creative activity and loved expressing their creativity through their unique masterpieces.

In Afternoon Nursery, we focused on the letter J and made adorable jellyfish crafts to reinforce letter recognition. We also practiced forming and recognizing numbers 1–10 through hands-on activities, songs, and games. During circle time, the children especially enjoyed singing number songs and playing number games, with Simple Simon Says being a class favorite!

The children have also been working hard on developing their fine motor skills. They love cutting and proudly created their own shape books, which helped strengthen both their scissor skills and shape recognition. We also reviewed the letters we have learned through a variety of Aleph-Bais games that incorporated gross motor skills, fine motor skills, and critical thinking. It is amazing to see how much the children have learned and how confidently they can recognize letters and identify their sounds.

She Might Just Drive You Crazy

Last year's school carpool was a disaster—all because of one member, Mrs. Engel. So, this year, I'm organizing a new carpool that will not include her. My reasons are not at all petty. She was always late, and she even forgot to pick up my daughter three times. In addition, she's an impatient lady who drives aggressively. My daughter came home traumatized a few times. On top of all that, she's on the phone, managing her high-pressure business during

the drive. I tried speaking to her, but nothing changed.

My question is about my friend Batsheva. Mrs. Engel is organizing her own carpool for the coming year, and Batsheva wants to be in it. Can I tell Batsheva what my experience with Mrs. Engel was like?

What's the Psak?

Do you know the halachah?

A Yes.

Protect her from learning the hard way.

B No.

You need to rebuke Mrs. Engel first.

C No.

Batsheva might not have the same reaction to Mrs. Engel.

What You're Getting Yourself Into

One of the conditions of *to'eles* is that we speak to the subject about the issue before speaking about him to others. This helps us understand the other person's side of the story and, if necessary, convince him to resolve the issue.¹ In this case, however, there is no point in approaching Mrs. Engel since Sheina has already left the carpool. Even if she did choose to speak to her, it's unlikely that Mrs. Engel is going to change her driving habits. The conversation would probably only serve to create more friction between the two of them.²

But since Batsheva will certainly appreciate knowing what she is getting herself into before agreeing to join Mrs. Engel's carpool,

Sheina is obligated to warn Batsheva.³ Sheina must be sure to only convey the facts, without exaggerating. She should do so to help Batsheva only—and not to get back at Mrs. Engel.

Answer: The halachah is **A**.

are gluten-free!" David's face lit up.

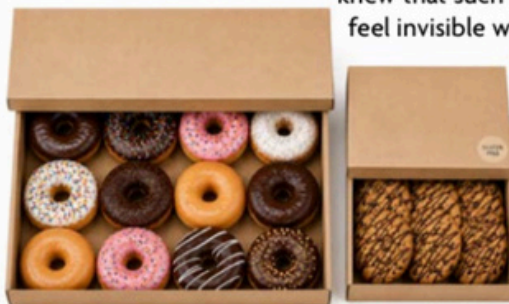
Later, the rebbi called Eli's mother to thank her for taking the extra step to include David in the celebration.

Were Yoel and Yehuda really so irresponsible?

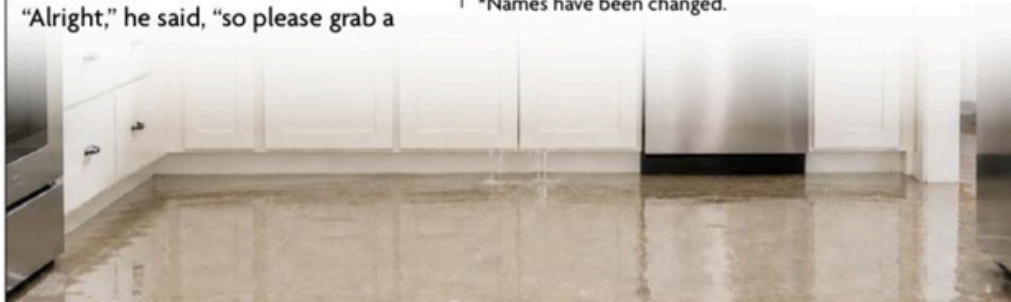
